## **Ancient Egypt**

Geography - The River Nile was extremely important to Ancient Egyptians. Can you find out about other significant rivers around the World and explain the impact these have on the people that live nearby?

Maths - research how Ancient Egyptians represented numbers. Can you create your own number sentences using these?

Choose one project (or create your own similar homework project) to bring to school at the end of the term.

Art - Create your own painting or drawing of an Ancient Egyptian scene considering what you know about daily life in Ancient Egypt.

History/ English - Find out about the discovery of the Rosetta stone. Write a newspaper article about its discovery and the impact this has on our understanding of Ancient Egyptians.

English/ Computing - Create a fact file about ancient Egypt. Think about the river Nile, the Pyramids, the gods, food and drink, their clothing and the houses. This could be typed, made as a poster or a slideshow.

**DT** - Research some of the food in Ancient Egypt. Find out some recipes and then practise making one of these.

DT/ maths - Can you create your own pyramids? Find out the different pyramid designs used in Ancient Egypt and make models using cardboard.

PE - create an obstacle course with an Ancient Egyptian theme. Draw a map of this obstacle course and explain what would need to be done at each station.

Science - What materials did they have available to them in Ancient Egypt? How were these used? Find out how the Ancient Egyptians used materials and their properties to help them in their daily lives.

Art - Design a piece of Ancient Egyptian jewellery. You could also make a model of this or draw some pictures.
